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### OUTSTANDING EXAMINATION RESULTS!

As we moved away from exam mitigations and back to formal examinations, St Louis results are stronger than ever.

At A Level 97.5% of students attained 5 or more A\*- C grades with 64.3% of all grades A\*/A and 87% of grades at A level A\*/B. We congratulate the 66 students who have left the school with 5 or more A grades and the 5 students (Conor Brolly, PJ McDonnell and Niall McIlhatton) who achieved a magnificent 4 A\* grades. A further 8 students achieved 5 A\* grades across a range of subjects at A Level.

Success continued at AS with a remarkable 54 students achieving 3 or more A grades. Furthermore, 4 students within the cohort achieved an outstanding 5 A grades and an additional 21 students secured 4 A grades at AS.

At GCSE level every single student attained 7 or more GCSEs at Grade A\*-C, including English and Maths, in fact 59 students have achieved an outstanding 9 or more A\*/A Grades with 81 students attaining 8 or more straight A\*/A grades and 90 students achieving 7 or more A\*/A grades. 7 students achieved 10 A\* grades.

These outstanding results do not happen by chance. They are the outcome of the commitment of the staff, sustained application by our students and the continuous encouragement by parents/guardians at home. St Louis is a community, where students, staff and parents/guardians work collectively. At St Louis we are all committed to excellence, endeavour and empowerment - faithful to our mission statement that every child within our care deserves to reach their full potential.

### A NIGHT WITH ST LOUIS

#### at The Tullyglass House Hotel - 20th October 2023

A sell-out crowd packed into the Tullyglass Hotel on Friday 20th October for a memorable night of insightful conversation and storytelling with seven greats of the GAA.

The event, run by Friends of St Louis, centred on the theme *The Student Athlete to the Elite Athlete.*' Compere extraordinaire Shane Elliot probed the guests on their experiences of playing and coaching football and hurling at second, third level and beyond. The Dunloy man also branched out his questioning to more broad issues in the modern games of Hurling & Gaelic Football, drawing fascinating insights from the panel.

First up was Gaelic Football with Peter Canavan, Paul McFlynn and Paddy Tally taking to the stage. Wasting no time, Shane opened the discussion on the topic on everyone lips of late - the appointment of Mickey Harte as Derry Senior Football Manager. A lively and diplomatic discussion ensued between the two Tyrone legends – one who played under Mickey and one who coached with him – and the Derry man Paul who will be a member of Harte's backroom team for the incoming season.

The three men went on to contribute their thoughts on the state of modern football, its defensive setup and the challenges facing underage teams in an age of ultra competitiveness.

After an interval where guests enjoyed a delicious buffet and the music of St Louis Traditional Group, there was a presentation to the All-Ireland winning Camogie Team.

The second half of the night centred on Hurling and Camogie. The impressive panel consisted of Martin Fogarty, Ursula Jacob, Neil McManus and Lucia McNaughton.

Discussion centred on the challenges facing young athletes in an age of social media. Ursula Jacob shared her own story of dealing with Twitter trolls when she talked about enough being enough.

Thanks to the meticulous planning of Mrs Johnston, our itinerary was packed with visits enabling all pupils and staff to experience different facets of each other's subjects.

As the Geographers navigated us through the streets of London (led by the fearless Rory Dunne), we learned about the socio-geographical aspects of London and how it has changed over the years. A visit to Canary Wharf also gave us an insight into the opulent world of capitalism where we visited a shopping mall that housed a Landrover showroom and a barber shop that gave buzz cuts for  $\Sigma 50$ . We also saw many familiar faces in the lobby as MPs left a fiery Prime Minister's Questions and had an impromptu chat with the MP for North Antrim.

Mrs Johnston arranged a workshop where pupils could discuss pertinent issues with MPs, and we were very lucky to have representatives from both the SDLP and the DUP to give their perspectives on the issues on the minds of our young people. Jude Osborne's forensic questioning of Paul Girvan led to a good-natured debate between the two, while Claire Hanna was challenged on how SDLP need to appeal to younger voters.

If a sense of revolt was present in the workshop, this may very well have been inspired by the two musicals pupils had watched on the previous evenings. Les Misérables and Hamilton provided two very different flavours of political rebellion. A rejuvenated visual show in Les Mis created a more modern performance that impressed everyone. However, the overwhelming consensus was that Hamilton had an energy and vitality that could not be rivalled.

All of these activities and visits were invaluable, but equally important was the sense of camaraderie amongst pupils and staff as we traversed the streets, tube stations and sights of London. Late night chats in the common room and laughs over pizza kept our spirits high as energy levels dipped. These encounters will be just as memorable as the many unique experiences we were afforded on this amazing trip.

#### **CIVILISATION!**

On 7th November, two other aspiring Civil Engineers and I visited QUB for an inside view of Civil Engineering projects in and around Belfast. During CIVILisation Belfast, we went to different sites such as:

- The Lagan Weir in Belfast, where we got to go underneath the weir through a service tunnel, learning about how the tunnels were created and how they are maintained.
- The Loft Lines construction site, a new set of luxury apartment buildings set to cost around £175 million, situated next to the Titanic Quarter. We were shown the methods they would use to improve the structural stability of the buildings using piles.
- The new Belfast Grand Central Station, currently under construction, where we had a virtual tour of the finished product of their £200 million redesign. We were allowed to go around the area, seeing the current progress of the construction.
- Victoria Square, where we learned about the fascinating physics behind the existence of such a large building. Surprisingly, the top of the building wobbles, which was quite interesting.


Throughout our visit to these sites, we were given detailed insights into how each of these brilliant structures were made, and we had a great time doing it. Personally, I think that this trip was a great opportunity for me to see the ins and outs of the intricate processes of how structures and mega-structures can come to be, as it's the smaller things that matter when it comes to civil engineering. At the start of the trip, I had assumed that we would just be getting a display of how they build buildings, never realizing how much effort needs to go into creating such structures.

While we didn't get to see every bit of work that goes into civil engineering, I feel as though the trip has taught me some of the more important stuff when it comes to structure and has shown me that even though you need to be smart to do engineering, the skill to communicate effectively is likely more important, as civil engineering isn't a solo job. The ability to do work and to communicate research is what allows engineers to work together and allows them to combine their independent fields to create something magnificent. Altogether, I would say that the trip was very educational and entertaining. If anyone ever considers civil engineering, they should consider more than their sheer intelligence because it is the communication between people that matters more.

Canon O'Donnell had long been anxious to establish a Convent for the education of the Catholic girls of Ballymena so in September 1924, St Louis High School was started with an enrolment of 35 pupils.

We celebrate that 100 years later St Louis Grammar School has an enrolment of 1181 and is a thriving school, providing exceptional Catholic education in the heart of Ballymena.
