
## 2023/2024

### **Annual Report of the Board of Governors**



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#### **INTRODUCTION**

It is with a deep sense of gratitude that we reflect on the year 2023-2024. A year that included the beginning of the one hundredth anniversary of the St Louis school and community. A milestone and a time for reflection. We began with concelebrated Mass led by Bishop Donal Mc Keown and former pupils, Reverend Fathers Gerry Fox, John Burns, Martin Kelly and current Governor, Father Michael McGinnity. This was a unique occasion and we heard a little of the journey and sacrifice that the early Sisters of Saint Louis made in establishing the school. We were deeply touched by Sister Eithne's contribution and the fact that so many of the Sisters were able to join us, along with over 400 past and present pupils, staff and parents, who also enjoyed a stunning afternoon tea and a tour of the school.

The centenary prompted a deeper appreciation of the St Louis community and of the need to strengthen relationships with former pupils and supporters of the school. To that end we appointed Marcus Cooper as Director of Engagement and Fund Development. The Friends of St Louis have worked hard to develop a range of events and we have also established active partnerships to support the school so that we have sufficient funds to provide for all the additional activities that are not funded by Government, in order to ensure that our students have the very best educational experience and preparation for the future. We believe firmly in maximising the potential of every child in our care.

The school motto 'Ut Sint Unum', that all may be one, reinforces our family centred approach and ethos. The spiritual development of our students is an intrinsic part of school life and we were delighted when we were awarded the Spirit of Catholic Education award. We strive to live the Gospel values in all aspects of school life and in our care and attention to others. Once again our pastoral care system has been recognised for excellence, having been nominated in the UK National Awards for Pastoral Care in Education. The mental and emotional wellbeing of our students is a priority and we achieved Take 5 Level 3 accreditation for the second year running.

It was another year of outstanding academic success, with 100% of students gaining A\*-C at GCSE in 7 subjects (including Maths and English), and 97.5% achieving A\*-C at A level in three or more subjects. I would like to acknowledge the exceptional work of the Mrs O'Neill as Principal, and the entire staff team who work tirelessly to stimulate and support students. Their commitment and the strive for excellence are exemplary, coupled with pupils' own hard work and the support of their parents and carers. A further reflection of this dedication is the wide range of sporting achievement and the diverse range of extra-curricular activities. The dizzying list of new sporting opportunities, including access to our new Strength and Conditioning Suite, competitions, quizzes, trips, workshops, all make an exciting and creative life at St Louis. This year also saw us achieve the 'Gaelbhratach'' Award for excellence in Irish language promotion, as well as students establish an Eco Council, fostering environmental awareness and sustainability. I would like to take this opportunity to acknowledge the contribution of Governors, who bring their free time, energy and expertise to the many challenges faced by the school organisation. I would also like to thank Eugene Reid for his contribution as Governor and who stepped down this year.

This report indicates how the Governors and others with responsibilities for the school i.e. the Department of Education and the Principal, discharged their duties, toward the school, referring specifically to the 2023-2024 year. On behalf of the Governors, I would like to thank you for your support and continued interest in St Louis Grammar School Ballymena.

The Board of Governors has overall responsibility for the effective management of the school. As well as the nominees of the Trustees (Sisters of St Louis) and the Department of Education, its membership includes an elected parent governor and a teacher elected by the teaching staff. The principal Mrs J O'Neill is also a non-voting member. The Board therefore represents all the main interests concerned with the school.

The Governors have particular responsibilities in relation to the curriculum, the appointment and dismissal of staff, admissions to the school, discipline, school finances and buildings. An important function for the Governors is to consider the needs of the school in terms of staff, buildings and other resources and to advise the various other authorities if they believe that these needs are not being met. An equally important function is to ensure that the resources available to the school are being used effectively. The post of governor is voluntary and the school is grateful for the time and expertise they contribute to the development of the school.

Responsibilities of the Board of Governors includes: management of the school to ensure that the best possible education and opportunities are provided for all pupils, monitoring and evaluating school performance, promoting self-evaluation across all areas of school life, fostering links with the local community, maintaining school buildings and personnel responsibilities.

This year, teachers Miss Canavan, Miss Lavery and Mr McNaughton said farewell to St Louis. Nonteaching staff members Mr Elliott, Miss Doherty and Mr Began also left the school. We thank these members of staff for their dedication and commitment to the school and wish them lots of happiness in the years ahead.

#### THE CURRICULUM

The curriculum at St Louis Grammar School is much wider than just formal lessons during the school day. It includes all the opportunities for learning encouraged by the school, including Drama, Sport, Music and cultural activities. The curriculum offered at St Louis provides pupils with a broad and balanced learning experience which not only fulfils all the statutory requirements of the Northern Ireland Curriculum but also encompasses opportunities for pupils to enhance their spiritual, cultural, personal and physical development in the context of a living faith.

The curriculum offered is built on established good practice. Pupil need/choice is accommodated where possible. Personal development is enhanced by the inclusion of a range of extra-curricular pursuits, Enrichment provision in Sixth form and Learning for Life and Work (LLW) as part of the Key Stage 3 and Key Stage 4 curriculum. The 'Cross-Curricular Skills' and 'Thinking Skills and Personal Capabilities' are embedded within programmes of study. The Governors and staff recognise the importance of a partnership involving themselves, the pupils and their parents.

#### Key Stage 3

All Key Stage 3 pupils study the following subjects:

Art & Design, Biology, Chemistry, Design & Technology, Drama, English with library skills, French, Geography, History, Home Economics, Digital ICT, Irish, Learning for Life and Work (incorporating Careers), Mathematics, Music, Physical Education, Physics, Religious Education and Spanish.

#### Key Stage 4

The school offered 21 subjects at GCSE in 2023/24.

The vast majority of Key Stage 4 pupils studied nine GCSEs, with some opting to study ten. Compulsory subjects were English, English Literature, Mathematics and Religious Education. Pupils then choose five other subjects out of the following: Art and Design, Biology, Business Studies, Computer Science, Drama, French, Geography, History, Home Economics, Digital ICT, Irish, Music, Physical Education, Science (Double Award / Single Award), Spanish, Technology and Design.

#### Key Stage 5

In 2023/24 Sixth Form pupils (Years 13 and 14) were able to select from 27 options at A Level.

Pupils in Year 13 studied for Advanced Subsidiary Level (AS Level) examinations. AS module examinations are normally taken at the end of Year 13. Year 14 pupils pursued Advanced Level (A2) courses and were entered for A2 module examinations in June. Throughout 2023-24, Careers education was compulsory for all Sixth Form pupils.

Any combination of AS/A Level subjects could be taken from the following: Art and Design, French Mathematics, Biology, Further Mathematics, Music, Business Studies, Geography, Physical Education, Chemistry, Physics, Government and Politics, Religious Education, Design and Technology, History, Drama, Nutrition and Food Science, Spanish, Economics, Digital Technology, English Literature, Irish, Health and Social Care. The following BTEC options are also offered: Business, ICT, Sport Studies, Engineering, Construction and the Built Environment.

#### PASTORAL CARE & DISCLIPLINE

Pastoral principles are based on a commitment to Catholic values. A climate is fostered in which each pupil becomes aware of being a cherished individual. Interaction between pupils and staff at St Louis takes place in an atmosphere of mutual respect and tolerance.

In order to promote effective learning matched to pupil needs and aptitudes, courses of study skills, a programme of Learning for Life and Work and individual counselling are provided. Pupils at KS3 also study Personal Development as a stand-alone subject which covers R.S.E. The R.S.E course and the preventative curriculum is also enriched through collaboration with external agencies.

The School's Code of Discipline informs pupils, parents and teachers of the standards of behaviour expected. It provides a framework which enables pupils to develop their own self-discipline.

The school has carefully co-ordinated an Anti-Bullying Policy designed to ensure the well-being of all pupils.

In accordance with DENI guidelines the school operates a Child Protection Policy, copies of which may be obtained from the school.

#### Complaints in Connection with Child Protection

If a parent/guardian has a concern about a child's safety, Mrs McGreevy, the designated teacher with responsibility for Child Protection should be contacted. In her absence, Mrs Toner deputy designated teacher for child protection should be contacted. If there is still a concern, then Mrs O'Neill should be contacted. If concerns remain then the parent should write to the Chairperson of the Board of Governors.

#### ASSESSMENT AND REPORTING

Knowing what your child is doing at school is important. Monitoring progress has always been a key responsibility of teachers. Parents received two reports last year and were invited to attend parent teacher meetings to keep them updated on their son/daughter's progress.

This year the tracking of each pupil's progress through Continuous Monitoring (CM) tasks was continued for each key stage. Personalised target setting for each pupil also continued. Underachievement and low achievement continued to be identified and intervention strategies were implemented. The mentoring programme, for example was implemented for those pupils who struggled to achieve their targets. Pupils continued to be motivated through the House System with House rewards given half-termly and termly. These included cinema trips. Any assessment arrangements will be suitably flexible to adapt to the changing legislative requirements.

The CM tracking was linked to the reporting format also available in SIMS. On numerical reports at KS3, parents were provided with a visual summary in the form of a bar graph of their child's progress against the personal target for each subject as well results and Behaviour and Effort scores and summative comments from their form teachers. Written reports also include comments from subject teachers and summative comments from Heads of Year.

As all assessments should provide opportunities for every pupil to experience a sense of success, Assessment for Learning strategies remained firmly embedded in practice.

CM tasks were reviewed by the Quality Assurance Committee as part of the school's monitoring and evaluation processes.

The school will implement any modifications to our Assessment Policy which the legislators choose to make.

#### CAREERS EDUCATION, INFORMATION & GUIDANCE

The Careers Department is responsible for all aspects of careers education, guidance and resources within the school. Our Careers Programme is delivered to ensure that pupils are sufficiently informed to make confident decisions about their education and career.

Employability is offered to all pupils in Key Stage 3 and 4 through Learning for Life and Work. In Employability lessons, pupils are provided with opportunities to help them develop those skills that are required for the world of work, such as communication, problem solving and collaboration.

Careers is provided as a discrete element and in a cross-curricular mode across a wide range of subjects. All classes in Years 10-14 have a timetabled careers education class. All Year 13 pupils spend a week on Work Experience. Year 13 and 14 pupils visit the local university open days, while admissions officers from a range of UK and Irish universities are only part of a group of speakers from higher and Further Education, professions and industry who address Sixth Form students. All Year 10, 12, 13 and 14 pupils are provided with the opportunity to have an interview with careers staff at specified times during the day.

Year 12 pupils engage in guidance interviews with careers advisors from the Department of Economy took place virtually. During the year, pupils also have access to the school's careers advisor who offered specialist advice at key transition stages. Pupils make extensive use of ICT and the careers library to access university prospectuses and careers software. Parents of pupils in Years 10 and 12 also have the opportunity to attend meetings with teachers whereby they could discuss decisions relating to subject options and career pathways. In the completion of their Higher Education application forms, Year 14 pupils are offered a wide range of group and individual support.

#### EXTERNAL RELATIONSHIPS / EDUCATION FOR MUTUAL UNDERSTANDING

The development of the Learning Community, Ballymena Learning Together, is an important step in terms of community relations in Ballymena but also for curriculum collaboration. The nine post primary schools are working closely together on a range of joint programmes. St Louis invites pupils from local schools to study various subjects.

The school is fully committed to involvement in community activity and cultural awareness. Integral to the educational process and central to the Christian message is the fostering of caring relationships. Throughout the school year, fund-raising is organized regularly with many local and national charities receiving significant donations. Links have been established with Friends of Romania and Lower Sixth pupils travel to Romania, bringing medical supplies and support to poor families and children in that region. The school has strong links with missionary groups in Ghana through our links with the St Louis Order who are heavily involved in missionary work in Africa. The school also works with voluntary/community groups in the greater Ballymena area and further afield. This year our pupils were involved in community programmes in association with St Vincent De Paul Society and Ballymena District Council, raising awareness of local and global social and citizenship issues.

The school strives for a strong partnership with parents. It continues to play an active and constructive role in the local community. The help of outside agencies has been enlisted as and when it is necessary.

The school also feels that it is an extremely valuable exercise to improve the links with the primary schools within the catchment area of the school. Mr McAleer facilitated Sport and Health and Wellbeing programmes in our feeder primary schools throughout the year. Our pupils also attended local primary schools to promote European Day of Languages and Maths week.

The Year 8 pupils were also able to attend the summer induction event in August 2023. The school continues to believe that these links with our feeder primary schools are very important to the effective delivery of pastoral care for our new pupils.

There are several links between school and the world of work - including work experience, mockinterviews, visiting speakers, Careers Conferences.

The link with the Education Authority has been strengthened through the expertise and support given by the Board Officers who seek to help departments and individual teachers in the implementation of various aspects of the Northern Ireland Curriculum.

#### LINKS WITH PARENTS / GUARDIANS

During 2023-2024, St Louis endeavoured to maintain strong communication links with parents. Parent teacher meeting and twice annually reports provided opportunities for teacher to update parents on pupil progress. Parent information events were also held for Year 8 and 11-14 to distribute key information such as exam/coursework dates and career pathways to parents. Parents were also invited into the school to attend a Revision Techniques workshop with Paul Gray from LearnSpark.

Various mediums were used by the school to communicate with parents – these included the school app and website, social media, the school's text messaging service and the termly newsletter, Kintullagh Voice. Frequent communication between teachers and parents was facilitated by the school's pastoral care structure and parents are always welcome to contact the school if they needed to discuss any relevant issues.

This year, the school conducted surveys with parents and pupils about a range of issues to better inform the school's planning for next year.

#### SPORT

How the curricular aims of the school have been met in relation to Sport:

- The P.E. Department has attempted to provide a range of sporting activities which represents a balanced programme of individual and team games.
- A range of selected games is provided that will maximise enjoyment and satisfaction through participation.
- Activities and teaching methods are encouraged which will encourage the inclusion, as opposed to the exclusion, of the majority of pupils in continued participation in physical activities, both in school and later in adult life.
- All sporting and P.E. activities will be developed as an aid to greater fitness in the whole school population
- Encouragement will be given to those games which result in opportunities for crosscommunity contact to enable pupils to experience the complex pluralistic nature of our society

However, the following sports were available to pupils at the school during timetable physical education classes, enrichment and as extra-curricular activities:

Association football (boys and girls), athletics, badminton, baseball, basketball, camogie, cross country, Gaelic football (boys and girls), golf, spin cycle, TRX training, weight training, boxercise, exercise to music, ladies football, gymnastics, hill walking, hurling, netball, rounders, swimming, handball, Olympic handball, boot camp, table tennis, tennis and volleyball.

#### SPECIAL NEEDS PROVISION

The main categories of Special Needs pupils are:

- (i) those with physical problems/disability,
- (ii) those with learning difficulties,
- (iii) those with severe emotional or domestic difficulties.
- (iv) those with sensory conditions visual/hearing impairments

We recognise that pupils with exceptional academic gifts require special consideration to maximise their potential. We were delighted to receive our Autism NI Impact Award in May 2023. By achieving this Impact Award, St Louis demonstrates that we offer an accredited autism accessible environment.

#### PROCESS OF SPECIAL NEEDS PROVISION:

- (i) Initial assessment of pupil needs. When this arises, it takes the form of consultation with Primary Schools, parents and information from EA
- (ii) Special induction for pupils as required. Review of resource provision by S.L.T.
- (iii) Communication of Special Needs information to appropriate staff by Pastoral Coordinator e.g. Statement/specific academic challenge.
- (iv) Creation of an individual education plan for pupils which is reviewed twice per year by SENCO of Special Needs cases and identification of emerging Special Needs pupils.
- (v) Referral and consultation with EA specialist services as required within schools/EA
   resources psychologist, Autism Advisory Agency and Rathmore Behaviour Support.
- (vi) Establishment of links between school and parents

#### SCHOOL FINANCES

The School Budget is calculated by the Department of Education using a formula which applies to all Voluntary Grammar Schools. The major element in the formula is the number of the pupils attending the school and their learning key stage. Other factors include the proportion of pupils who are entitled to free school meals, the area of the school buildings and grounds, maintenance and administration costs.

For the year 2023-24, the School Budget Allocation was calculated as £5,893,401. This budget was expanded to cover all staffing, cleaning and maintenance, pupil materials, heating, lighting and insurance costs. Teaching staff costs amounted to 68.07% of the resource available.

The school is funded 100% by the Department of Education and a Capital Fee is not charged to the pupils.
