Representing Ireland at the European Girls' **Mathematical Olympiad in Kosovo**

Representing Ireland at the European Girls' Mathematical Olympiad in Kosovo was an unforgettable experience. Alongside three other talented girls from across Ireland, I had the opportunity to compete against some of the best young mathematicians from around the world. Our team was very successful — I was proud to win a bronze medal, and the rest of my team received honourable mentions. This was a historic moment for Ireland, as it was the first time everyone on our team won an award, making us the second most successful Irish team ever and marking Ireland's first medal in five years.

In preparation, I attended intensive training camps at UCD in Dublin and UCC in Cork. They were very challenging, but we had a lot of fun in the evenings and learned a great deal from the sessions. These camps really helped me improve my problem-solving skills and build confidence ahead of the competition.

The competition itself was extremely difficult, involving two challenging exams, each lasting four and a half hours, with three questions of increasing difficulty. It tested our problem-solving skills and perseverance, but the experience went far beyond the exams. During our trip, I made friends from all over the world — including some from as far away as Australia. I also got to reconnect with old friends I'd met at previous events, which was really lovely.

We also spent time with other teams — we toured the city with the Finnish team, which was a great way to see some of Kosovo's beautiful sights. After the exams, we enjoyed a buffet lunch, mocktails, and played cards with the Albanian team. We even took part in a workshop at Jane Street, which was incredibly interesting and gave us a fascinating glimpse into the world of finance and trading.

Aside from the competition, we explored some amazing places. A particular highlight was visiting **Prizren Fortress**, a site inhabited since the Bronze Age, offering a glimpse into Kosovo's rich history. We also had a fun day at Prishtina Mall, the largest shopping centre in Southeast Europe, where we tackled an escape room challenge.

Overall, this trip was one of the most incredible experiences I've ever had. It was not only a chance to compete in a subject I love but also a wonderful adventure, filled with new friendships and unforgettable memories

Year 8 Numeracy Day - 3 June 2025


Year 8 began with a thrilling Murder Mystery Challenge, working in teams to solve five mathematical clues and crack the case. Next came the high-energy **Task Mathster** — a creative spin on Channel 4's Taskmaster. Pupils tackled a series of quirky, fast-paced challenges, from calculating Miss Warnock's age in minutes to folding the perfect paper plane and reciting the quadratic formula by heart. Creativity, accuracy and quick thinking were all put to the test, and prizes went to the highest-scoring and most imaginative teams.

Year 9 Numeracy Day - 5 June 2025

Year 9 pupils faced a trio of team-based challenges. The day opened with Code-Breaking, introducing the

pivotal role of mathematicians in cracking the Enigma cipher during the Second World War, before pupils attempted their own codes. Next came an immersive Escape Room, where teams solved mathematical problems to unlock five 'room keys' and escape St Louis Grammar. The finale was a fast-paced **Relay** Round, with pupils racing the clock to solve problems. Competitive spirit and collaboration shone through, with prizes for the top teams in each round.

Both days were a resounding success. Pupils were fully engaged from start to finish, reinforcing key numeracy skills while fostering teamwork, resilience and a genuine love of learning. We are already looking forward to next year!



Our Vice Principal, Mrs McGreevy, was particularly delighted to see her again and said that Daniella was always an inspiration at St Louis. Daniella was one of two young people from Ireland recognised with the Pramerica Spirit of Community Youth Volunteer Award in 2018 and went on to represent Ireland at an international event in Washington D.C.

Daniella told us that she has carried on this work,

"While at St Louis I advocated for women and children who were affected by domestic abuse on the BBC Children in Need Youth Panel from 2015 to 2019. After leaving school I went on to join the BBC Children in Need Northern Ireland Advisory Committee in 2020 until my time came to an end last year in 2024".

Daniella is also a Trustee and volunteer at White Ribbon NI, a charity dedicated to challenging the attitudes and beliefs that lead to male violence against women,

"I love travelling around the country and visiting organisations, sports teams and schools that are committed to helping us achieve our mission. We deliver our Listen, Learn, Lead workshops to young people from the age of 14 and have



challenging conversations with them about the attitudes and beliefs that lead to violence against women and girls.

I recently founded the White Ribbon NI Junior Board. I feel so passionate about guiding the next generation of young leaders. I started on a youth board at the age of 14 and know the benefits it can have. Our youngest member is 13 years old, and I really enjoy holding our meetings every month in the office and seeing their dedication, initiative, and drive.

We're committed to having young voices feed into our organisation and involving young people in changing harmful attitudes and to encourage respectful behaviours towards women".

Daniella has also been selected to represent County Antrim at this year's Miss Ireland Competition where she will be highlighting her work to end violence against women and girls as part of the competition's 'Beauty with a Purpose' initiative.

Hearts Set on Mission: Looking Ahead to Ghana

In June, a group of 14 students and 5 staff from St Louis Grammar School, Ballymena, will travel to Ghana for a mission immersion experience that promises to shape hearts and minds in profound ways. The visit will centre around the St Louis Sisters' vibrant community in Oku – a place that radiates the joy, hospitality, and dedication characteristic of St Louis missions across the globe.

This journey has not happened by chance. It has been the fruit of months of careful planning, fundraising, prayer, and generous support – both financial and spiritual – from our local parishes, families, and the wider Ballymena and North Antrim communities. We are deeply grateful. Every donation, every word of encouragement, every prayer offered has made this possible. The group of students travelling to Ghana has shown great commitment – dedicating themselves wholeheartedly to attending training, fundraising, organising events, raising awareness, and sharing the spirit of the mission with their local communities. I am immensely proud of the way they have prepared for this journey.

I would also like to thank their parents. I do not take lightly the trust they have placed in us to lead this trip and to care for their children for over two weeks. It is a profound responsibility and an honour. I am equally grateful to the staff members who have helped me prepare for this experience – all of whom are putting their own lives on hold and leaving their families behind to ensure our pupils can have this transformative opportunity. Their generosity of spirit and commitment to our school community is humbling.

At its heart, this trip is not just about travel. It is about mission – a word that runs deep through the life of the Church and our school community. Mission is about encounter, accompaniment, and the willingness to serve others, particularly those at the margins. It is a way of life that asks us to step beyond our own comfort zones and live out the Gospel through action.

Mission is at the heart of what we do at St Louis Grammar School – and it is also at the heart of our faith. The great missionary journeys of St Paul remind us that we are all called to go out, to serve, and to be Christ's hands and feet in the world. Like St Paul, our students will travel not simply to do, but to encounter – to meet others, to build relationships, and to witness the presence of God in unfamiliar places.

Our pupils and staff will be working closely with the school and clinic run by the St Louis Sisters in Oku. They'll assist in painting classrooms, planting crops, engaging with children through workshops on development education, and contributing to a small building project. But above all, they'll learn. They'll listen. And they'll return changed.

As a teacher and missionary, I've had the privilege of working in Brazil, Kenya, Tanzania, Ethiopia, Ghana, and Zambia.

Each experience has confirmed something simple but powerful: that the people we think we are going to help often end up

teaching us far more. They show us resilience, dignity, joy, and a deep sense of community – values that transcend borders and challenge how we live our own lives back home.

Their work in education, healthcare, and pastoral care brings real hope to communities who live with far less than we do materially, but whose faith and generosity are deeply enriching. Our pupils will walk alongside them this summer, sharing stories, work, laughter, and faith.

We are also inspired this year by the appointment of Pope Leo XIV, our new Holy Father, who himself served as a missionary in his earlier years. His deep understanding of the global Church and his call to walk with the poor and the forgotten remind us that mission is not a side-line of the Church – it is its very heart.

Mission reminds us of who we are and what we are called to be. It calls each one of us to look outwards – beyond our borders, beyond our assumptions – and to respond in love.

Learning and Teaching at St Louis: Highlights from 2024/25



This year at St Louis has been a rewarding one for Learning and Teaching, driven by a shared commitment to professional development, collaboration and new ideas.

We began the academic year in August 2024 by welcoming staff back with a vibrant and energising day of TEEP refresher training. TEEP has been firmly embedded in our school since our journey began in 2017, and this year we were keen to revisit and refresh our approach. It was a fantastic day of sharing best practice, collaborating across departments and trying out new strategies to bring into the classroom. We're proud to say that all new staff completed their TEEP Level 1 training by the end of the school year, ensuring a consistent, high-quality approach to teaching across the school.

In September, Mrs O'Neill was invited to one of our feeder primary schools, Millquarter Primary, where she led TEEP training for teaching staff and classroom assistants. It's lovely to know that some of our prospective pupils will already be familiar with the TEEP learning cycle before they even arrive at St Louis—helping to ease the transition and build continuity in learning.

During November, we hosted our first-ever TeachMeet, centred on exploring how AI can enhance Learning and Teaching. This informal, teacher-led event brought together colleagues from across departments to share practical tools and classroom experiences. Among the highlights were Mr McAleer's insights on using Quizizz for engaging formative assessment, Mr Bradley's demonstration of how TextBlaze can streamline workflows, Miss Barker's approach to creating immersive experiences using Humy AI and Mrs Morgan's tips on creating video content using InVideo. The event sparked real momentum and reflected our staff's enthusiasm for innovation and collaboration.

In January, we delivered assemblies on the TEEP cycle and effective learner behaviours to all Key Stages, helping pupils better understand how they learn and encouraging them to become more reflective and independent. That same month, our induction teachers took part in a 10-week 'Breakfast Bites' programme, meeting every Thursday morning with different members of staff who hold leadership and responsibility roles. These short, focused sessions gave our induction teachers valuable insights into the many facets of school life.



Also in January, staff engaged in a whole-school professional learning session on retrieval practice, our key learning focus for the year, and this session laid the foundation for further development.

Mrs Stevenson delivered a presentation on how she used Retrieval Practice in an interactive way with her Year 8 History class.

In February, we hosted a follow-up TeachMeet where Mrs McDonald, Mrs Scott, Miss McNeill, Mrs McClintock and Mrs Morgan shared how they've embedded retrieval strategies into their teaching. A real highlight was hearing from sixth form students Emilie Arthur, Keira Young and Caoimhe Scullion who shared how retrieval practice supports their learning in class and at home. A Parents' Guide to Retrieval Practice was also distributed to Year 10 and Year 12 families and will be shared more widely next year—ensuring we continue to support our pupils together, in school and at home.

As Term 3 progressed and departments began planning and developing resources for the new academic year, refresher sessions were held on key aspects across the curriculum and wider school life. Staff voluntarily signed up to attend these optional sessions, reflecting a strong collective commitment to continuous improvement and peer learning. Additionally, regular updates from our Coordinators throughout the year have proven highly beneficial to our ongoing development and communication.

In May, St Louis was proud to host a TeachMeet specifically for Numeracy Coordinators, welcoming 21 Co-Ordinators from across a wide network of schools. The event was facilitated by Amanda O'Brien, our

EA link professional, and featured a talk from Danielle McKernan (Everway), who introduced an innovative app to improve accessibility and engagement in Numeracy. It was a valuable opportunity to exchange best practice, build connections and strengthen the trusted professional network across schools.

To round off the year, in June, staff were treated to an inspiring session on developing digital skills across the curriculum, led by Nicole O'Connor from Digi Know This and organised by Miss Scullion. The session offered practical strategies on how to empower pupils to become confident, responsible digital learners and supported our continued focus on preparing students for learning in a digital world.

Throughout the year, our staff have also engaged in a wide range of external professional learning opportunities through St Mary's University College, the Education Authority, LearnSpark and SSAT.

In addition, several teachers are pursuing Masters and Doctoral qualifications, reinforcing our culture of lifelong learning and evidence-based practice.

We're incredibly proud of the commitment, creativity and community spirit shown by both staff and students throughout the year. Their efforts truly embody our school mantra—Excellence, Endeavour and Empowerment—as well as one of our five core values: Learning.

We're grateful to the entire SLG community for their continued support and involvement and we look forward to building on this progress together in the year ahead.

We are incredibly proud of all our students for their determination, effort, and sportsmanship. We hope these memorable days will inspire continued participation in sport and physical activity both in and out of school.



Six-Time World Champion: A Reflection on the 2025 World Irish Dancing Championships


