## ST LOUIS' CONTINUE TO SET THE BENCHMARK FOR OUTSTANDING EXAM RESULTS

St Louis' Grammar celebrated another year of excellent GCSE and A Level exam results. An incredible 96% of all A level students attained A\* to C grades across three or more subjects. Furthermore, 100% of students achieved 7A\* to C GCSE grades including Maths and English. This outstanding performance marks yet another high point in personal and academic achievements for both staff and students and further consolidates St Louis' credentials as one of the top Grammar Schools in Northern Ireland.

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While there are many individual success stories, special recognition must go to Niamh Gould and her remarkable 4A\* outcome at A Level. These fabulous results have enabled Niamh to read Medicine at Oxford University. As well as this, 15 students also achieved A\*-A Grades in 3 or more subjects!

There were also phenomenal achievements at GCSE. Notably for the Doherty twins: Martyn attained 11A\* and his brother Patrick not to be out done with 10A\* grades.

Neska Connon and Alisija Sestakova also received a staggering 10A\*. Alisija also gained an A grade in AS level Russian.

This is a very small sample of the wonderful accomplishments of such a talented senior cohort.

Principal, Mr Rafferty, congratulated students, "We are extremely proud of our students. Their immense success can be attributed to the hard work and perseverance of staff and students alike. Our GCSE and A Level cohorts rose to the challenges posed by their subject courses and have evidently reaped the rewards. To have achieved such a remarkable percentage of top grades denotes a consistent performance at the highest level. Supported by dedicated staff and families, these students have both the confidence and qualifications, to aspire to their chosen careers and futures."

As further recognition of our success and prestige, The Sunday Times Parent Power survey of secondary schools has placed St Louis' Grammar in the UK's top 100!



#### PILGRIMAGE TO LOUGH DERG

At the end of June, following summer exams, a group of nine Year 14 students along with Mrs O'Neill and Mrs McGinn set off on a three day pilgrimage to Lough Derg, County Donegal.

Lough Derg is a religious pilgrimage site dating back to the sixth century and is a religious haven that believes self-sacrifice and removal from the everyday rush of life can bring you closer to God.

Following a two hour bus journey, and a short ferry ride, the group arrived on the island. Everyone made their way to their dormitories to remove socks and shoes before beginning silent prayer whilst walking barefoot around the rock beds outside.

Upon completion of the first three stations, the group was treated to a 'Lough Derg meal' of dry toast and black tea (having been fasting since mid-night, this proved to be more of a treat than it sounds)!

The 24 hour vigil began at 10pm on the first day. The group challenged themselves to stay awake while completing stations four to seven inside the basilica, this lasted to 6am mass.

Throughout the second day they were given the opportunity to take time to themselves to relax and enjoy the peacefulness of the island.



After 9pm prayer, sleep was finally permitted for the first time in two days!

On the third day, following 6am mass and the completion of one final station outside, pilgrims were reunited with their socks and shoes before returning to the mainland and the comparative chaos of everyday life.

Keelan Faith reflected on his experience "Despite the hardships we were faced with throughout our time on the island, Lough Derg provides us with the opportunity to get away from the stresses and worries of the everyday world, become closer with God and provided us with a sense of peace and tranquility like no other. We were all in agreement that it is an invaluable experience which we hope to do again next year."

#### ROMANIA – SUMMER 2017

On Sunday, 9th July 2017, thirteen Lower Sixth and seven Upper Sixth students set out on the long journey to the Transylvania region of Romania.

## TOP CANDIDATES IN NORTHERN IRELAND

St Louis' Grammar is exceptionally proud of a number of students who have achieved the highly coveted accolade of being recognised as the top candidates in Northern Ireland for particular CCEA examination subjects.

Astoundingly, Bronwyn McAuley, Siofra Patterson, Shannon O'Kane, Natasha Selby and Caoimhinn Gormley all received first place in Northern Ireland in GCSE Art and Design. Caoimhinn Gormley secured yet another first place in GCSE Construction. Eoin McCusker has been awarded joint first place for GCSE PE.



Furthermore, a remarkable achievement for Patrick Doherty as he came first in both English Language and Literature. Erin Gould was also placed third for her excellent work in GCSE Business Studies.

This is wonderful acknowledgement of all the hard work and dedication of our students and teachers.



#### **GOLD PRESIDENT'S AWARD**

The President's Award is the world's leading youth achievement award and pupils of St Louis' have been given the opportunity to take part in this scheme. There are two progressive levels of programmes that our students can avail of: Silver and Gold.

The award is a direct challenge from the President of Ireland to young people. By taking part in this award, pupils of St Louis' will experience exciting personal, physical and community challenges and develop new skills as well as friendships.

St Louis' Gold Award pupils completed a challenging but adrenaline charged hill walking expedition in the Wicklow Mountains National Park. The aim of this expedition is to develop initiative and a spirit of adventure by planning, training for and completing a journey as part of a team

The participants departed for Wicklow Mountains National park on Wednesday 21st June, 2017. En route to Wicklow, the group stopped off at Tayto Park in Co. Meath. Here they enjoyed climbing wall activities, team building challenges and the experience of watching Mr Trainor stand on his tip toes to ensure that he was the correct height to ride on the rollercoaster! At this early stage, it was evident that each group had a strong team spirit and even though they were about to face a difficult challenge over the next four days, the enjoyment and excitement was palpable from every student.

On arrival in County Wicklow, pupils were based in Lough Dan Scout Camp. This allowed for final planning of routes, an equipment check and a chance to relax and cook some dinner. There was no evidence of nerves as pupils began to build fires, play music and avail of the outdoor scout swimming pool.

Day one of the expedition was set out to test pupils. This was the first experience since the practice hike of working as a team to navigate through an area of Ireland many pupils had never been before. Although there were some questionable navigation decisions at times, all pupils returned to the camp site safely.

Day two posed a significant challenge for the pupils. Battered by heavy rain and fog, pupils climbed along an old railway track to the top of Camaderry Mountain towards Turlough Hill Power Station. At this point, with the weather getting significantly worse, staff took the decision to follow the escape route off the mountain. Once pupils came off the mountain, they took shelter and began to make hot drinks.

As soon as the pupils were filled with hot chocolate and coffee, they followed the low level escape route that they had planned to camp. Having been weather beaten throughout the day, Mr Quinn had to work overtime on first aid duty!

The third day of this expedition was the most enjoyable for the pupils. Knowing that the President's Award assessor would be meeting them at different points along the route, each pupil had to take ownership of one navigation leg. Pupils climbed along the Spinc and dropped down into Glendalough. This was the most picturesque part of the trip and the enjoyment and sense of achievement on the pupils' faces was evident as they stopped for selfies along the route and took time to jump into the natural rock pools. With perfect conditions and fantastic scenery, pupils began to feel a sense of achievement that the tough test that they had put themselves through was beginning to appear worthwile. To top this all off, they received excellent feedback from the assessor about their conduct, ability and knowledge so the morale at camp was very positive.

On completing the expedition on Sunday 25th June, pupils had time to reflect on what they had achieved over the past five days. From a leader's point of view, it was fantastic that all the training and preparation had led to a successful expedition. But from watching the pupils as they came off the mountains and completed their expedition, the sense of togetherness, community and friendship that had been strenghtened from completing this award was evident throughout. The realisation that they had successfully planned, navigated, cooked and camped together as a group was sinking in.

The aim of this expedition is to develop initiative and a spirit of adventure by planning, training for and completing an adventurous journey as part of a team. Staff firmly believe that our pupils developed skills and a sense of achievement that will stand with them for many years to come.

Pupils now have to complete the remaining sections of this award. Once the voluenteering, skill, residential and physical sections are signed off, pupils will have successfully completed the Gold level of this President's award and will receive their certificates.

The sincere words of advice will no doubt have resonated with the young people in attendance who will be eager to grasp every opportunity to learn, enquire and reflect in school and beyond.

The evening concluded with a presentation to the new Head Boy and Head Girl, Padhraig Magill and Elise O'Neill, along with their team of Deputies.



Visiting Creagh enabled students to see what they found from their research in real life and much more.

On arrival, students were provided with tea, coffee and refreshments before they attended a presentation given by the HR director, Mrs Lorna McMullan. The presentation outlined the history of the firm, its organisational structure, how they communicate with stakeholders and the opportunities and challenges they face in the external environment. It was most informative and provided students with a significant insight into Creagh Concrete as well as proving to be a massive help with their coursework.

Following the presentation, students were given a tour of the Creagh Concrete factory. Throughout the tour, they observed the detailed production floors showing how precast concrete products are manufactured. Specialist staff from Creagh were more than happy to answer students' questions and to provide them with a wealth of information about the business.

Students were also given the opportunity to look closely at plans and designs of buildings which Creagh Concrete's employees are currently working on. They learnt about Creagh's CAD Academy where world class training is provided for those who would like to pursue a career in computer aided design (CAD). Needless to say, they were extremely interested in what this involved.

Before leaving, Creagh provided students with a lovely lunch at the Elk restaurant and a bag full of goodies to take home!

The generosity of staff at Creagh was second to none and students are highly grateful.

Year 13 Applied Business Studies students found the trip most useful. Students returned to St Louis' with a greater insight into the workings of Creagh and a tremendous amount of information which will help them complete their coursework to a high standard. One student commented, "The visit to Creagh was really interesting. The presentation we were given and the opportunity to ask questions while we were touring the factory means that we've got lots of information for our coursework. We learnt things that you definitely wouldn't have found out from secondary research".



#### LMC VISIT

On Wednesday, 15th November, Year 11 Home Economics classes were provided with a fun and educational demonstration on how to cook three Livestock and Meat Commission inspired dishes. The recipes were for creamy peppered beef, grilled lamb tabbouleh and meatballs with mozzarella.

Throughout the demonstration, Elizabeth Brown provided us with information on food provenance and traceability, explaining how food can be traced from our plate back to the farm that it was reared on. She also highlighted the importance of food safety whilst handling raw meat, as well as the risk of contamination.

We, as students, were informed of the precautions to take whilst in the kitchen reinforcing what we have been taught in Home Economics since Year 8. From the recipes that were cooked, the majority favoured the meatballs, but the creamy peppered beef came a close second. The least favourite was the lamb, as Ms Brown had predicted. We were also introduced to new ingredients in the form of bulgar wheat and feta cheese which could be used in our GCSE practicals.

Declan Mallon left St Louis' in June 2017 and has provided current students with an account of his apprenticeship so far with Deloitte.

Leaving school is a big change, no matter which path you take, you will be meeting different people and trying new things.

Throughout my time at school, I never really fancied the prospect of going to university, I always had my eye on the apprenticeship route. I feel many people were afraid of the apprenticeship route as it meant that they would have very little time outside of work, but one of the key benefits of doing the apprenticeship is that you don't have to get a part time job to get money, meaning you will have more time at weekends and in the evenings.

So far this year I have lived in Belfast with other students, so I haven't felt left out of the social side of university. I've met new friends through this and through work, and although I'm not able to go out as often as my friends who are at university, there are still enough opportunities for me to go on nights out around Belfast!

One of my worries about being on the apprenticeship is that it would be a massive jump from going to school to suddenly having a '9-5 job', whilst trying to study for my accountancy qualifications. However, working in an office with people who have completed these exams recently means that I am able to get help and guidance from them, whereas at university you may often be left on your own.

In my first week on the job, we were all flown over to London for our induction week. This consisted of mostly preparing us for life at Deloitte and giving us time to meet our new colleagues and get to know them.



After that, I completed a five-week training programme which was very tough as I was presented with lots of information in a short space of time, this meant I was often left exhausted at the end of the week. Nevertheless, after this we realised the benefit of the intense training as it ensured we had some background knowledge before being thrust into the office environment.

So far I have enjoyed my time on the apprenticeship route as the tasks we are given are challenging, but you always have someone to help guide you through the task so you're never left stuck.

If anyone is considering accountancy, I would definitely recommend doing an apprenticeship. Although it is demanding having a '9-5 job' whilst trying to maintain a social life and continue playing for sports teams or keeping up hobbies, I feel the benefits definitely outweigh the drawbacks!

#### SHANNON QUINN - GRAPHIC DESIGNER

Past pupil, Shannon Quinn, graduated from University of Ulster School of Art in Belfast in June 2017. Shannon studied Art and Design in St Louis' and achieved full marks in all elements of her A-Level course. She was successful in gaining entry to the degree course without studying a foundation, which was a huge achievement and a result of her talents as well as her hard work and commitment to her chosen pathway.

Shannon is currently working as an intern for Selfbuild Ireland, who organise events for people renovating their homes. Shannon's job is to create all their print work and online promotional material. She also designs articles for their magazine which comes out four times a year. #### SUTTON TRUST US PROGRAMME

I applied to the Sutton Trust US programme in December 2016 and was lucky enough to be one of the 150 students selected to take part in the programme out of over 1500 applicants. The Sutton Trust US programme aims to make studying in the US accessible for low to middle income UK state school students, through providing admissions help and a week-long residential at an American university during the summer.

I attended an Introductory Residential in April 2017, which was hosted by London School of Economics. At this residential, we learned about all the work that will be required of us in the coming months in preparation for applying to the US, such as sitting ACT examinations, SAT subject tests, drafting Common App essays, filling out financial aid forms, teacher references and finally sending your Early Decision application on November 1st. I also met lots of wonderful people from all over the UK and made lots of new friends, which has been my favourite part of this experience.

The highlight of the programme so far was the week-long residential at Massachusetts Institute of Technology in Boston during the summer. This trip was fully paid for by the Sutton Trust. We stayed in MIT dorms right beside the River Charles, which gave us the perfect view of the boats which sail up and down all day long. The aim of the trip was to give us an experience of American college life, so we visited lots of different types of colleges such as Bowdoin, Dartmouth and Brown, which are liberal arts institutions, and Wellesley and Smith, which are women's colleges. We were given tours of all the campuses and had information sessions with the international admissions tutors from each college.

Whilst in Boston, we also attended a Red Sox game, had an evening free at the mall, saw MIT's Media Lab, went to the Quincy Market and walked along the Freedom Trail. One of the Sutton Trust's sponsors, Bank of America Merrill Lynch, held an event on the very top floor of the Bank of America offices in Boston, where we had dinner and got to network with employees.

On our final day in America, we attended a private college fair for Sutton Trust students only at Harvard. Representatives from 50 different colleges attended, and we had 3 hours to visit each stand and network with as many of them as possible. It was the most amazing, life-changing week of my life.

Now, I'm busy finalising my applications for US institutions. I would recommend this programme to all students because it is an amazing (and also completely free) opportunity to apply to and experience American universities. It's also guaranteed to be the best summer of your life!


St Louis' Grammar School is the first School in Northern Ireland to lead the
