ST LOUIS EXPANSION PLANS UPDATE

Over recent months thankfully a number of building upgrades have come together. We are delighted that we have now secured £4m from the Department of Education to fund the total refurbishment of the Convent House and build a new Drama Studio on the site of the existing Chapel, Kintullagh House will become a Centre of Excellence for **Creative & Expressive Arts and will contain** all our Music/Drama/Art and Moving Image Arts classes.

We also have plans at an advanced stage to create a 40 space car park in the wooded area to the front of Kintullagh House, costing approximately £400k.

In January we received word that £1m has been secured to rebuild our school Canteen. This is a big project in that we will have to demolish existing building and re-build on same site and feed over 1000 pupils each day!

Our School Council will meet with Architects to have an input to the final design which we hope will have a real 'wow factor' as well as provide high guality food distribution.

Many thanks also to those generous benefactors, parents and past pupils who have enabled us to match fund our sports project which will enable us to develop a new multi-purpose indoor gym, dance studio, spin/fitness centre and sports seminar facility. The project comes in at £560k and will start over the summer and our students can hardly wait. The completed project, funded by Mid & East Antrim Council/Sport NI and St Louis benefactors, will have a community link and provide a valuable opportunity for out of school use by local sporting and non-sporting groups.

Finally, we are in the final stages of preparation of a business case to transform our grass pitch to a multi-purpose 4G pitch, which will enable all our inter-school matches to be played on a home venue.

So as you can see, it's certainly going to be a busy 18 months for all involved with St Louis upgrades...we are confident, however, this extensive capital investment will add to our resources in a way that will benefit every member of our school community for many years to come.

The All Ireland awards recognise post-primary students for *"outstanding"* acts of volunteerism and the positive contribution they make in their local communities and further afield.

Nathan is one of twenty finalists and has been a member of St John's Ambulance for seven years. He gives up three nights a week to carry out patient transfers and his dedication began after he himself suffered a serious injury and was tended to by St John's Ambulance members.

On weekends, Nathan provides first aid as part of an ambulance crew at events such as stock car racing and football matches. He also works as part of a crew to provide ambulance response in unison with the Northern Ireland Ambulance Service to reduce the pressure on their paramedics during busy periods.

Principal of St Louis Grammar School, Mr Rafferty said: "Nathan is an exemplary student in every respect who is very modest and does not seek any recognition for his work. He is a very genuine and caring student who truly wants to help the community and continues to do so despite his previous injury. He is a shining example to his peers, with great courage and integrity."

The twenty finalists, who hail from all corners of Ireland, will be presented with €500 and an engraved silver medallion at a gala awards ceremony which will be held in Lough Eske Castle Hotel and Spa in Donegal.

At the gala, two of the twenty students will be named All Ireland Youth Volunteers of the Year, receiving €1,000 for a charity of their choice; a gold medallion; a crystal trophy for their school and an all-expense paid trip to the United States in May to participate in the Prudential Spirit of Community Awards Ceremony.

EYE FOR EDUCATION

On Monday 5th January 2016, Year 14 students took part in the "Eye for Education" project to help them develop their interview skills for the future. Students were given the scenario that they were applying for a job with the American company, Amazon.co.uk.

The day began with students filling out a standard job application form, which highlighted their qualifications, personal information and interests. The students then carried out an intellectual test, consisting of 25 Maths and English problems which the company actually uses in real life interviews. The final task the students had to undertake was designing a mobile application to try and tackle childhood obesity. This particular challenge tested students' teamwork attributes, helping to identify natural leaders and key contributors.

Finally, students had to partake in a 30 minute interview. Immediately after, students were given a final one-to-one analysis of their performance in their interview and a review of their score in each test. The six most successful students were given a prize, and everyone felt that they had developed their interview skills significantly.

Under the leadership of Mr Marquess and with the help of three local assistants, the staff and students enjoyed spending time with children and young adults in various places of care. The incredible fundraising efforts of the Lower Sixth students ensured each centre in the Brasov area was provided with much needed resources and equipment. The trip, while intense and emotional was a very rewarding and humbling experience for all involved.

Niamh Gould, a Year 13 student, reflected on her experience: "Our time in Romania proved not only rewarding but also gave us a new perspective on how advantaged we are, as well as highlighting the importance of helping those in less favorable situations. Although at some points our trip was difficult, we all enjoyed our experience in Romania.

Visiting a number of home and schools for children allowed us to see the benefit of the extensive fundraising we carried out before leaving. Being able to spend time with the children and to provide them with aid was an amazing experience. It was evident, when visiting these homes, the improvements that Friends for Romania have made to the lives of many who would otherwise have very little.

What I found the most striking about my trip was how grateful people were for things which we take for granted. Romania helped to make me aware of the extent of work charities like Friends for Romania do for those suffering from poverty and also allowed our group as a whole to successfully help the people who need it most."

ALL STARS

St Louis is celebrating the news that nine students received Ulster Colleges' All Star awards this year. Six male students were honoured with Hurling All Stars while three female students were Camogie All Star recipients.

Both sports held a first set of trials in early November and players were then selected to attend a final trial later in the month. As always the standard was very high and to have six hurling all stars in one year is exceptional and this equals the biggest representation from a single school in the 28 year history of the scheme.

St Louis hurlers won the Mageean Cup back in October for only the second time in the school's history. Player of the match in that final, James McNaughton won his first All Star award in 2015. James joins his brother Nicholas and sisters Una and Lucia who all collected Ulster Colleges' All Stars during their time in the school. The Loughgiel clubman is also an Antrim and Ulster Boxing champion.

Mageean captain Cathal McNaughton collects his second award, as last year he was selected at centre half back and in 2015 he was selected at full back. The St Louis list is



completed by the Dunloy quartet of Ryan Elliott (Goal Keeper), Eoin O'Neill (mid field), Conal Cunning (corner forward) and Ciaran Elliott (corner forward). The four Cuchuallians players were central figures in their club's county success in 2015 as well as to the St Louis Casements and Mageean campaigns in the last two years. Ryan Elliott is the son of former Dunloy, Antrim and Ulster keeper Shane, who was selected on the first ever Colleges' Hurling All Star team in 1998. St Louis' total of All Stars now stands at 40.

13 of the 15 Hurlers selected on this year's team come from Antrim schools. While St Louis have the highest representation, Cross and Passion have two, St Killian's have two and beaten Mageean finalists St Mary's CBS also have two. Colaiste Feirste and Rathmore Grammar in Belfast both have one All Star each.

St Louis camogs reached the semi final of the Senior A competition only to lose out by three points to eventual champions St Patrick's Maghera who had a comprehensive victory over St Mary's Magherafelt in mid-December. Victoria Edgar, Therese McKinley and Caitriona Graham were key players in the St Louis 2015 campaign and were worthy recipients for Colleges' All Stars. Once again Caitriona Graham retains the goal keeper jersey to collect her second award. The Ahoghill star was also recently awarded the Most Promising Young Player of the Year award at the County Presentation evening following a good year with the Saffron U16 team. Therese McKinley and Victoria Edgar both received their first awards and were selected in the forward line. Therese's brothers Ciaran and Donal were both awarded Hurling All Stars during their sixth form years in St Louis. She was also part of the victorious Loughgiel Shamrocks team which won the Antrim Intermediate championship this summer and then the Ulster Junior Championship in the autumn. Victoria Edgar has battled back from a serious knee injury and has been in fine scoring form for St Louis as well as her club and county in 2015.

Head of PE and Sport in St Louis, Gearoid Adams was full of praise for the nine students who were honoured as All Stars this year and added, "to have nine All Stars in two codes in one year is an incredible achievement for the school. Those who were fortunate to be selected have been consistently performing at a high standard for us and also achieving on the pitch with their clubs and county. They are great role models for their peers and the junior pupils in St Louis. We have had a very successful year with the hurlers and the camogs, and their mentor Miss Donaghy deserves credit for their efforts as they have competed with the best schools in Ulster and have bridged the gap in terms of results and standards at that level. We know these recipients will be the leaders in the promotion of Gaelic games in St Louis which is our key focus at present and our games staff and players are constantly working hard to achieve more success. Well done to all - we are very proud of them."

MACLARNON CUP SEMI FINAL



Patrician Carrickmacross 2-11 St Louis Ballymena 0-8

St Louis' attempt to complete an Ulster Colleges double this year unravelled in Lurgan on Saturday 27th February as Patrician Carrickmacross earned their place in the 2016 MacLarnon final.

Despite going on the attack from the throw in, St Louis were a point in arrears after ninety seconds of play and this was a lead Patrician did not relinquish over the sixty minutes of play. Their opening score came from the boot of mid-fielder, Ronan McDonald who was a dominant player for the Monaghan side. Less than a minute later, Alan Kieran got his first score of the day to double Patrician's lead. Eamon Fyfe opened the St Louis account in the fourth minute as he converted a 13m free following a foul on Eoin Campbell. Patrician tagged on three more points by the tenth minute as on each occasion the St Louis attack broke down and the opposition worked the ball quickly up field allowing Edward Walsh, McDonald and Shane Duffy to all score from play. Mid way through the first half, Connell Lemon got on the end of a well worked St Louis move to reduce the gap to three points. Duffy and Keelan Molloy traded points for their sides before St Louis were struck a hard blow as referee Kevin Falloon awarded Patrician a penalty following a 23rd minute foul inside the danger area on Karl McMenamin. Duffy duly converted the spot kick and St Louis found themselves trailing by six points. However, Mr Adams' side scored the next three points through a converted Fyfe 13m free, another Keelan Molloy curling left footed shot and Ronan Kelly scored with his first touch of the game following his introduction into the forward line in place of Michael O'Connell. St Louis had done well to reduce the gap to three points but on the stroke of half time, Alan Kieran got his second point of the game and as both teams headed for the changing rooms, Patrician had a 1-7 to 0-6 half time advantage.

Patrician always looked dangerous on the attack during the second half and two converted frees from Fergal Hannerty either side of another Shane Duffy free gave Carrickmacross a six point lead after forty five minutes of play. When Shane Woods was judged to have touched the ball on the ground, Keelan Molloy converted the resultant 20m free but it was to be his side's last score of the game despite having the majority of possession in the final twelve minutes of play. Unfortunately, Connell Lemon's goal bound effort skimmed just across the front of the goal line in the 52nd minute. Shane Duffy converted his second free of the half three minutes from time but the game was well out of St Louis' reach. Patrician advanced to the St Patrick's Day showpiece against Holy Trinity College Cookstown.

On reflection, St Louis can be proud of their performance during the campaign. On numerous occasions during the semi final, they attacked with flair and style but the Patrician team was slick on the counter attack. Many of the St Louis MacLarnon squad are on the All Ireland hurling panel and they must be commended for their commitment to the senior teams.

POPE JOHN PAUL II AWARD

On Thursday 4th February, 10 sixth year students facilitated by Miss Bigmore, received the Pope John Paul II Award.

The Pope John Paul II Award is dedicated to the memory of the late Pope John Paul II whose love of young people was so profound.

YPI

This year, St Louis participated in the Youth and Philanthropy Initiative which has become a tradition in school. YPI provides pupils with a hands on experience of philanthropy through an academic course which gives them the skills to assess local community needs and make grants to grassroots charities.

Pupils build relations with representatives from their chosen charity and, following skills training in investigation and public speaking, present on the reasons their proposed charity is most deserving of support. The group judged to have made the most compelling presentation in each school wins a £3000 grant to award to their charity.

During the process, pupils develop teamwork, communication and presentation skills. This year's winning team consisted of Ciara Fraser, Ciara McKittrick, Sinead Devine and Taylor McNeill.



Ciara Fraser reflected on their group's experience:

"The charity we chose was the Motor Neurone Disease Association which helps people suffering with this condition in our local community. Motor neurone disease is when your muscles stop working over a period of time and it has a massive impact on the person's life as well as their loved ones.

We worked in class and at home on our project and divided the parts evenly. We wanted to be able to give MNDA something even if we didn't win, so we raised over £140 by collecting spare change.

We had to compete against the other groups in our class and Miss Pickering and our class decided which group would be the best to go through to the final. The final took place on February 11th. The winning groups and wild cards out of each class took part and the four judges decided who deserved the prize. A member of the MNDA also came and watched the final. We chose MNDA because a member of the group is deeply affected by MND and we believe it needs to be addressed more in our community. The YPI project has helped us, individually and as a group, become more confident and aware of the issues in our community and also we found it very enjoyable."

BELFAST EXPOSED

A-Level Art and Moving Image Arts pupil Sandra Janik has successfully gained a place on the Belfast Exposed Futures Project.

Belfast Exposed Photography is Northern Ireland's principal gallery of contemporary photography, commissioning, publishing and showing work by local and international photographers. This project has provided Sandra with the opportunity to participate in monthly workshops where she works with pupils from other schools in Northern Ireland to gain knowledge, understanding and practical skills in photography.

Sandra offered an insight into her experience: 'In this project I am gaining the opportunity to create professional photographs utilising traditional techniques such as developing in a dark room. So far we have visited Belfast Exposed Gallery, MAC Gallery and University of Ulster, where tutors informed us about Photography and Fine Art degrees. I have been able to work with pupils from other schools which has improved my communication skills through expressing my opinions in relation to Art. In the forthcoming sessions we will be working towards our final outcome. I am very much enjoying this experience.'

We are delighted that Sandra's photographic talent has been recognised by such a prestigious organisation which is renowned for creating significant springboards for artists to build their careers!

The application process began in October with a personal statement, a piece of written work and an admission test called the ELAT all required. I then received an invitation for interview in November for St. Peter's College. Oxford consists of thirty eight colleges with St. Peter's being one of the smallest, friendliest and most central.

The interview process took place in early December. In preparation, Miss O'Neill and Mrs Kearney organised mock interviews for me which were extremely helpful. I had two interviews in the college and stayed for four days, as applicants may be called to other colleges for interview. The interviews were casual but challenging, essentially short but intense



academic conversations with professors. They involved sight reading three poems and analysing them. However I wasn't asked anything beyond what I could be expected to know!

Having completed this application process I was thrilled to receive an offer to study at St. Peter's.
