

After pitching their Business Plan to a panel of judges made up of entrepreneurs and Subway Franchisees, they were awarded second place and won an impressive £750!

ROMANIA 2017

Once again the St Louis students had undertaken a massive fundraising programme and their efforts resulted in the purchase of many essential items for all the children's homes, centres and schools they visited throughout the week.

It was an emotionally challenging week for the St Louis' group but the students were exceptional in their interaction and activities with all the various age groups they encountered. They brought joy and happiness to many, many people in a short time.

Year 13 pupil Aislinn McAleer reflects on her experience:

In February 2017, I had the amazing opportunity to visit the beautiful country of Romania. We stayed in a lovely accommodation called 'Casa Elim' which was about half an hour from the town centre Brasov. Thirty-six of my peers and I travelled along with five members of staff. The events I experienced on my visit are ones that I will never forget.

On the lead up to the trip, I tried to envision what I would soon experience when we arrived in Brasov. However looking back on my trip now, I realise that nothing could have prepared me for what I would witness. My fondest memory of the trip was the Monday after we arrived. Being part of Group 3, in the afternoon of the Monday we visited a boys orphanage called 'Peter Pan'. As none of us had ever been before we had an apprehensive bus journey to the orphanage as we attempted to visualise what awaited us.

The boys we standing waiting for us as we walked into the main room situated at the front of the compound. They seemed to be as nervous as the 12 of us all were. However, as soon as the balloons and face paints were brought out the atmosphere shifted to a lively one and the room became full of laughter and chaos.

The snow outside was at least ankle deep but despite the freezing temperature we were all eager to get out and play. I am honoured to have met the boys of 'Peter Pan' and everyone I met for that matter- young and old. Although I was able to give them an hour or so and happiness and fun, my experience opened my eyes and has inspired me to become more involved in charity work. I definitely have a different outlook on my life now and I am able to fully appreciate how lucky I am.

Last November I took part in the annual National Cadet of the Year competition, where I competed against my fellow cadets from across Northern Ireland. We completed a first aid scenario, delivered a pre-planned presentation, an interview and a group discussion exercise and were scored throughout. I won the competition and became Cadet of the Year for 2017, and shortly after was promoted to Leading Cadet within my unit, giving me extra responsibilities and duties as a role model to other cadets within my unit. As part of my duties as National Cadet of the Year, I travelled to England on the 24th – 26th of February to compete in the District Cadet of the Year competition.

This competition lasted the whole weekend and we took part in similar tasks as the national competition, only at a higher level. Our assessors were trained paramedics for the first aid assessment and for the other assessments we were assessed by the Director of Youth and Community for SJA, a Major Trauma Nurse Specialist, the Assistant Director Operations South East Coast Ambulance, the Regional Director London and South East, a member of the RAF Police and the outgoing National Cadet of the Year.

On the Sunday there was an awards ceremony where the Regional and Deputy Regional Cadets of the Year, along with the National Cadet of the Year were announced. I won the title of Regional Cadet of the Year for the Commanderies where I now represent not only Northern Ireland but also Jersey, Guernsey and the Isle of Man. It has been a wonderful experience so far and the fact that I now get to travel as part of my role is a bonus. HEALTH, WELLBEING AND LIFESTYLE

In this edition of Kintullagh Voice we will discuss how refining and focusing our breathing technique can unlock greater levels of fitness and improved health.

The Oxygen Advantage

Oxygen is the most important nutrients in our body; we can survive for weeks and days without food and water, whereas only minutes without Oxygen. Respiratory muscles control airflow into and out of our lungs, while gas exchange occurs in the alveoli and muscles cells to ensure our tissues are saturated with Oxygen. Thankfully these processes are outside our conscious control - we don't have to remember to breathe!

It is instinctual for humans to breathe in and out their nose at rest, however somewhere along the line we have developed the process of using our mouths more to inhale and exhale. The problem associated with this is it starts to use muscles of the chest and neck to regulate breathing, rather than exclusively rely on the involuntary diaphragm and intercostal muscles. This means we use more than we need to, we over-complicate breathing and become inefficient.

Thankfully this is something that is easy to reverse; all you need to do is follow these simple steps – 'Breathe Light to Breathe Right'.

Breathe Light to Breathe Right

- At rest make a conscious effort to only breathe in and out through your nose this may take effort at first but the more you practice it the more habitual it will become. A couple of minutes at time to begin with is fine.
- Let your diaphragm control your breathing. As you inhale your tummy should push out, then suck back in as you exhale.
- Focus on decreasing the frequency of your breathing, longer and slower breathes in and out is a lot more efficient than lots of little breathes.
- Where possible practice this technique lying down with your hands on your belly –this gives you a great appreciation of how the diaphragm can control breathing.
- Become aware of how breathing properly starts to make you feel more relaxed and better about yourself!

Further Strategies to Assess and Improve Breathing

Breathing Pyramids

This is a simple breathing exercise you can practice that will improve the efficiency of your respiratory system.

- Start by relaxing and regaining a normal breathing pattern. Breathe in and out through your nose.
- First of all inhale for 1 second and then exhale for 1 second.
- Then inhale for 2 seconds and exhale for 2 seconds. Continue to increase the length of each inhalation and exhalation.
- Work up to either 6 or 7 seconds inhalation/exhalation and then come back down the pyramid to 1 second.
- When inhaling concentrate on pushing your tummy out, exhaling sucking your tummy in. This ensures the diaphragm is controlling the process.
- Give yourself 1 minute rest and repeat a further 2 times. If you can do this once a day you will start to notice an improvement, a couple of times a day then even better!
- You can even practice this pyramid on the m---ove by replacing seconds with steps. Breathe in for a step out for a step, breathe in for 2 steps and out for 2 steps....

The final piece of advice is to consider where you get your supply of Oxygen from. The best place is from outside by going for a walk in a wood, on a beach, up a mountain, on an adventure! Improving health, wellbeing and lifestyle doesn't have to laborious, expensive and time-consuming! It's about making good decisions little and often that will make you feel better!

If you have any underlying health issues or concerns please consult your GP before taking on board any of the strategies outlined above..

FINLAND VISIT

Over the midterm break, myself, Priya Thomas, Shannon Turner, Emma McKeever Naomi Rafferty and 10 pupils from other local schools spent a week in Finland as part of a Finnish and Irish young women's exchange programme. The aim of the programme was to discuss our differing experiences and sometimes problems, growing up as young women in our respective countries.

Our first new experience came on our very first morning in Finland, when we were taken down to the seemingly endless frozen lake outside our accommodation and were amazed at how casually our Finnish friends stepped out onto the lake; not surprising considering they race their cars on the frozen lakes for fun! That evening we then got to try sledging down a candle lit slope and we also got to know the Finnish girls a bit better.

The next day we went shopping in Kotka and afterwards we spent the rest of the day skiing. For all the Northern Irish group it was our first time skiing, so it was both daunting and exciting to try it for the first time. As we grew in confidence we then could progress onto the bigger ski slope and were treated to a barbecue with toasted marshmallows in the evening. The next day we went to an event organised by a local school and got to make and try traditional Finnish foods such as sweet buns and meat pies. The Finnish group then prepared a Finnish culture night where we learnt Finnish phrases such as " Moi" (meaning hello) and " kiitos" (meaning thank you) and then we were allowed to try the Finnish obsession that is the sauna!

On Sunday we went to Helsinki, where we visited the modern art museum, local landmarks and shopped...a lot! On our sixth day we spent a school day at Pyhtää, which was a really eye opening and worthwhile experience. We learned that children don't start school until the age of seven and the particular school we visited caters for children aged seven to eighteen, meaning you could potentially be at the same school for eleven years. While sitting in a Swedish lesson (although I didn't learn any Swedish), I discovered that if a child was restless they could sit on an exercise ball instead of a chair and there are 15 minutes breaks between each lesson!

What I learned from this experience was that the Finnish girls are really not that different from ourselves (although they may be more accustomed to ice and snow!) and we look forward to seeing them again when they come to visit in June. On behalf of the students from our school, I would like to thank Miss Pickering for her organisation of the trip and keeping us entertained with her singing on the bus journevs!

THE WONDER OF TESSA

On Wednesday 22nd March, 8 Lismoyle spent a most memorable afternoon when they received a very special and spirited visitor to their English lesson. At just 4 years of age, little Tessa Evans from Maghera is the tiny girl with the big message: that different is beautiful.

Tessa was born with an extremely rare congenital facial condition known as 'Arhinia', meaning she was born without a nose. Her visit coincided with Year 8's current novel Wonder, a story by RJ Palacio which follows the character of 10-year-old August Pullman, born with Treacher Collins syndrome and a cleft palate. The novel traces the difficulties faced by Auggie as he attempts to navigate the daunting and unchartered waters of middle school in New York.

Tessa's mum, Grainne, is a huge fan of the novel and welcomes the popularity it has rapidly gained since its publication in 2012. She has fully embraced the opportunity Wonder has granted their family to raise awareness about Tessa's condition and emphasise the importance of the book's central themes and message: to celebrate difference rather than 'looking away' from it.

Once the clear parallels between Auggie and Tessa's story were identified, it was agreed within the English department that there was enormous scope for a valuable learning opportunity. 8 Lismoyle were immediately excited and prepared so impressively for the event that Tessa was immediately at ease. Our pupils fell in love with her almost instantly! Demonstrating great sensitivity, the class introduced themselves individually and each member warmly shared the personal characteristic which distinguishes them as unique. As a result, many surprising and entertaining discoveries were made, and once the ice was broken it wasn't long before Tessa had hugs, high-fives and fist bumps for the entire group!

A lively and informative discussion stemmed from the varied questions 8 Lismoyle had carefully devised, which surrounded 3 main areas of focus: the fears Tessa's parents have for the future, negative experiences they've had in public, and lastly, the many positive aspects that Tessa's condition has brought to their lives.

Tessa then gave a very informative demonstration of how her tracheostomy worked, before introducing her special baby doll 'John' (pictured), who also wears a 'trachy.' With their help, Grainne showed pupils how they regularly have to clean it using a special suction machine.

All in all, it was a thoroughly productive and uplifting learning experience for our Year 8s. Thanks to little Tessa, they all made extremely perceptive and sophisticated connections with Wonder, and her magnetic personality really brought the novel to life! They learned a valuable lesson in compassion and empathy from a wonderful teacher, who has since been unanimously conferred honorary membership to 8 Lismoyle!
