

ONCE UPON A TIME

St Louis students attended a special screening of the BAFTA award-winning series "Once Upon a Time in Northern Ireland" at Oueen's Film Theatre, Belfast, on April 16th.

The event was hosted as part of an Education Authority pilot to explore how the acclaimed documentary series might be used as a resource in schools to help the next generation better understand Northern Ireland's past. Following an initial viewing for educationalists in October 2023, ten schools volunteered to participate in a new pilot to help co-construct a professional development module designed to aid schools in delivering sensitive topics in class. The screening was part of this process, inviting young people to share their views on the series and how it could support classroom practice.

The film was introduced by Clare Sillery, BBC Head of Documentaries, and Jayne Simms, a school improvement professional at the Education Authority. It was followed by a panel discussion hosted by Declan Lawn, one of the creators of the BBC drama "Blue Lights" and a past pupil of St Louis.

One of our students, Jude Osbourne, said, "I think through the use of personal stories rather than the broad historical narrative, it helps you humanize the conflict, making it easier to understand others' emotions and points of view. This, in my opinion, helps with future reconciliation and dialogue between the two communities. I think it should be a mandatory watch for everyone, regardless of whether they lived through it or not."

The students were very impressed with the program, although somewhat disturbed by the events many of us lived through. One hopes it instills in them a desire to ensure that Northern Ireland never returns to those very dark years.





UKMT MATHS TEAM CHALLENGE

This year, on the 29th April, our school competed in the UKMT Team Maths Challenge.

The competition took place in St. Malachy's College Belfast and the team consisted of two Year 9 and two Year 10 pupils. There were four rounds in the challenge but they were all very different. SLG ALUMNI Where are they now?

KATE DEVLIN, CLASS OF '98

The Kintullagh Voice was delighted to catch up with Kate Devlin recently. Kate left St Louis in 1998 to study English at Trinity and is now Politics and Whitehall Editor at The Independent in London. Having previously worked at The Times and The Sunday Express, in 2023 she was named 'one to watch' as one of the top 100 Women in Westminster.

Kate explained that journalism was always something she was passionate about and, after hearing another former St Louis pupil speak at a Careers Day at the school, that was confirmed.

"Conor Hanna, who worked at The Mirror and has since gone on to great success in America alongside his boss at the time, Piers Morgan, described journalism as 'the most fun you have not working for a living. To keep my mum happy I did go and listen to the Bank of Ireland talk, but I couldn't see myself as a banker and it was journalism that had me hooked".

Work experience in Year 12 at the Ballymena Guardian settled it for Kate. With History and English as her favourite subjects at St Louis, political journalism was a natural fit.

"I would advise anyone thinking about journalism to go for it. It's a fast paced work environment, especially now. Digital means that stories can break at any time of the day or night and be around the world in an instant. In political journalism you are at the centre of everything that affects people's lives and you can influence perceptions through your writing and use of language.

"I broke a story last year, before the Labour Party Conference, that Marina Wheeler, Boris Johnson's ex-wife, was to be a special adviser for the Labour Party. It was picked up by every national media outlet in the UK within hours. 


