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SUPERB RESULTS AT ST LOUIS

This year marks a special milestone for St Louis Grammar School, Ballymena, as we celebrate our Centenary alongside exceptional A Level and GCSE results.

At A Level, an impressive 97.6% of students achieved three or more A*-C grades, with over 85% of all grades being A*-B. Many students have secured places in prestigious university courses across Ireland and the UK, while others are embarking on apprenticeships with top companies such as PWC and Deloitte. These achievements reflect the hard work and determination of our students, supported by the dedication of our staff and the constant encouragement of their families.

Our GCSE results are equally remarkable, with over 99% of Year 12 pupils attaining seven or more A*-C grades, including English and Maths. Among this cohort, 67 students achieved eight or more A*/A grades, and 78 students earned seven or more A*/A grades. Overall, 82% of all GCSE grades were A*-B. Special congratulations go to Robert Crooks, who achieved 11 GCSEs including nine A* grades, and Eibhleann Ardiff, Benjamin Marrs, and Laura McClean, who each earned an outstanding 10 A* grades.

At St Louis, we pride ourselves on fostering a supportive environment that prioritises both academic excellence and emotional wellbeing. These results are a testament to our whole-school approach, where students, staff, and parents work together to help every individual reach their full potential in a happy and secure setting.

We are incredibly proud of all our students in the Class of 2024 and wish them every success as they take their next steps in education and beyond.


We extend our heartfelt gratitude to everyone involved in organising this wonderful evening, including our dedicated staff, SLT, and everyone in between.



Our voices, Our Stories

Everyone knows the cliché question: "If you were stranded on an island, what would you take?" Most people think of phones or water. Speaking as someone who was shipwrecked on an island, I can tell you what you truly need.

On 19th August 2024, I was on holiday in Greece, sailing around with my uncle (a seasoned skipper), two aunts, and my cousin. We stopped at Paxos, a tranquil island known for its clear waters. That morning, I noticed a thunderstorm forecasted. Annoyed, I figured I'd spend the time reading.

The storm escalated quickly, with heavy rain and strong winds. Boats began fleeing the harbour, but we decided to ride it out at anchor. However, the anchor lost grip, and we were forced to leave. Worse still, the navigation failed, and visibility was so poor we couldn't see far ahead. Attempts to re-anchor failed as the weather worsened. Then, our boat capsized in the fierce wind, righting itself moments later- but the engine was gone.

Panic set in. My aunt scrambled below deck to find life vests. There were only four adult vests and a child's one too small for me. My uncle decided he'd go without. As we prepared to abandon ship, we struck rocks. My uncle shouted for us to jump. I landed in the water, waves crashing over me.

Clinging to a rock, I thought I would die as the boat crushed against me. Peace washed over me as I accepted my fate—until my aunt dragged me onto the rocks.

The five of us huddled together, battered and terrified.

We found a small cave but had to flee as it started collapsing. Sitting exposed to the storm, we screamed for help at a passing boat. Though unable to assist, it stayed nearby, giving us hope.

Eventually, a diving team arrived. They swam to us, urging us to jump into the water and swim to safety. Overwhelmed with fear, I was helped into the water by my family. Two divers supported me to the rescue boat, where I collapsed, shivering and in pain.

Once ashore, the divers helped us with blankets, antiseptic, and even money for necessities, as we had lost everything. Their kindness brought us to tears. At the medical centre, despite its rundown state, the staff provided care and dry clothes. Finally, I was able to call my mum.

This harrowing experience gave me a profound appreciation for life and the kindness of strangers. It taught me that behind every smile, there may be unseen battles- and that compassion is priceless.

What does it mean to be stuck between a rock and a hard place? Me!

My ultimate dream is to compete on the Olympic stage before I retire. If that dream doesn't come true for me, I am determined to advocate for DMT's inclusion in the Olympics. My goal is to create opportunities for the young gymnasts who look up to me now, ensuring their dreams can one day become reality.

Behind the Scenes: A Day in My Life

Training Day

A typical training day is as rigorous as it is rewarding:

8:00 AM: Breakfast with the team.

9:00 AM: Team meeting to discuss training times and plans for the day.

10:00 AM: Downtime to prepare for the day, packing leotards and extra kit if needed.

11:00 AM – 2:00 PM: Training in the warm-up hall with breaks to stay refreshed.

2:00 PM - 5:00 PM: Training on the field of play, familiarising myself with the competition equipment. **4:00 PM:** Media interviews, photos, questions, and autograph signings.

5:00 PM – 7:00 PM: Recovery with physios, including massages, ankle taping, and icing. **7:00 PM:** Dinner with the team.

8:00 PM: Evening team meeting to review hotel rules and plans.

After 9:00 PM: Downtime before lights out, ensuring a good night's rest.



Competition Day

On competition days, the schedule is even more intense:

7:00 AM: Breakfast to fuel up for the day ahead. **8:00 AM:** Arrival at the arena to mentally prepare for the competition.

9:00 AM: Watching competitors in other groups for motivation and insight.

10:00 AM: Warm-up in the designated warm-up hall.10:30 AM: Practice routines on the warm-up equipment.11:15 AM: March out into the competition hall with my group.

11:30 AM: Two-touch warm-up on the Double Mini Trampoline.

11:45 AM: The competition begins, waiting for my turn to perform.

12:00 PM – 12:30 PM: Compete, giving my all in front of the judges and audience.

1:00 PM: Media interviews, signing autographs, and taking photos with the team.

MOCK INTERVIEWS

A recent Mock Multiple Mini Interview (MMI) evening at St Louis offered Year 14 students a valuable opportunity to gain practical experience and guidance, thanks to the support and expertise of past pupils and medical professionals. Led by distinguished alumna Dr. Carol Wilson, a highly respected physician and role model, the event provided aspiring healthcare students with an engaging platform to refine their interview skills.

The MMI format, widely utilised in medical school admissions, assesses candidates through timed scenarios that evaluate key attributes such as communication, ethical reasoning, and critical thinking. Recognising the significance of thorough preparation, Dr. Wilson, along with a dedicated team of past pupils, parents, and medical professionals, generously volunteered their time to simulate the interview environment. Their feedback and insights left students feeling better equipped and more confident about their future applications.

Participants described the experience as transformative. One student remarked, "*Getting feedback from people who've been through the process was incredibly helpful. I feel much more prepared and motivated now.*"

This event highlighted the strong bonds between past pupils and the school, demonstrating how such connections continue to inspire and empower the next generation of professionals.







YEAR 11 ENGLISH BLITZ

On Wednesday 15th of November, Year 11 pupils took part in the English GCSE Revision Blitz. This blitz spanned across 5 hours and students received a bespoke revision session for all 5 tasks that would come up in their GCSE exam on 15th November. Teachers worked collaboratively to create engaging and effective revision sessions to equip the pupils for their first ever GCSE! Sixth Form English mentors were also a great help on the day, helping Year 11s with ideas as they completed group work and individual tasks.





Firstly, my class - 11 Laragh - went over Section A of the Unit 1 paper with Miss Barker. We had a walking debate where we had to decide on the most important elements to include in our persuasive writing essays, and then worked together to practice writing effective paragraphs for a range of questions that could come up in the exam. We got to use peer assessment to mark these, as well as receiving feedback from our teacher and two Sixth Form Prefects who were there to help us out! Next, we went to Miss McNeill and she discussed Task 2 and 3 with us. We practised writing PETAL paragraphs here and worked together in small groups to point out techniques in an extract, and worked to discuss the effect of these. Lastly, we went over Task 4 and 5 with Miss Murray who got us involved in alphabet analysers to remember techniques, helped us with practice PETALs and worked with us to create points based on colour, image and layout for a range of images that could come up in Task 5!

I really enjoyed this blitz as I thought it was really useful to get tips from a range of teachers in the lead up to the exam. We gained new experiences, learning how to do a task in a different way than we might normally have done it. I would definitely love to do it again for English and even other subjects too!


BOOK WEEK NI

ADDRESSING BULLYING HEAD PREFECTS



INTERNATIONAL CHEMISTRY OLYMPIAD Saudi Arabia

This summer, I had the privilege of representing Ireland at the International Chemistry Olympiad in Riyadh, Saudi Arabia (21st–30th July). This ten-day trip provided me with unforgettable memories and was undoubtedly a once-in-a-lifetime experience.

I was selected for the Olympiad team based on my performance in an online exam in February, followed by a written exam at DCU in April. In June, I travelled to Trinity College Dublin for two days of practical laboratory training, where I met my fellow teammates and became acquainted with technical chemical apparatus far beyond anything I had encountered at SLG.

On 20th July, the team and I travelled to Dublin Airport for our early-morning flight to Riyadh. To say the trip had a rocky start would be an understatement. An hour before our expected arrival time, we began a rapid descent. Upon touchdown, we discovered that a technical fault with the plane had forced us to land not in the Arabian capital—but in Basra, Iraq, of all places. If anything can force four students and two mentors to bond quickly, it's an emergency landing! Thankfully, after a stressful few hours, we were able to board a connecting flight and finally arrived in Riyadh.

Upon arrival, we were transported to our accommodation for the week at King Saud University. We had to quickly adjust to the caustic Arabian heat (40°C), Saudi cuisine, and their prized delicacy of coffee and dates. After registering, we were required to relinquish our phones, smartwatches, and laptops to ensure we couldn't communicate with our mentors and thereby cheat during the competition—a somewhat unwelcome digital detox.

Over the ten days, I met individuals from all over the world: Denmark, Japan, Syria, Kyrgyzstan, Australia, Peru, and many more. My roommate was Milo, from France, with whom I remain in contact to this day. On one occasion, I even gave my friend Nicholas from Costa Rica advice about his upcoming trip to Belfast! I was struck by the universality of the English language—how fortunate we are to speak it, and the importance of learning and preserving languages as a cornerstone of culture.

I have many stand-out memories from my time in Saudi. On one of our first nights, the team and I played cards for hours with the Georgian, American, and Italian teams—



a session that eventually turned into an unusual international version of karaoke. We visited the historic town of Diriyah, the former home of the Saudi royal family, as well as various shopping centres and museums. Our trip also coincided with the All-Ireland Football Final, which we watched at the Irish Embassy. The contrast between the familiarity of a GAA match and the backdrop of a Middle Eastern city was almost surreal, and it was a particular highlight of the trip.

The Olympiad itself consisted of a five-hour practical exam and a five-hour theoretical exam. The practical exam came first and involved several experiments, including determining the oxalic acid content of turmeric and performing thin-layer chromatography. The theoretical exam, two days later, was equally demanding, covering a wide range of physical, organic, inorganic, and analytical chemistry. I was greatly inspired by the sheer intelligence of the other competitors. One conversation with a Moldovan team member stands out, where she casually mentioned her full-ride scholarship to Yale as though commenting on the weather!

Although I did not win a medal at the Olympiad, the whole experience was simply extraordinary. I am extremely grateful to the St. Louis Chemistry Department for the opportunity to enter the first round. I encourage all A-Level Chemistry students to take part in future Chemistry Olympiads- you never know where it might take you!

The day began in the David Keir Building, where the opening statement left a lasting impression: *"Engineers save more lives than doctors."* While surprising at first, as Andrzej Smolinski reflected, *"The delivery of clean drinking water around the world actually makes this a reasonable claim."*

The event highlighted the immense effort and precision required in civil engineering projects, from the hidden complexities beneath Belfast's iconic landmarks to the innovative measures protecting the city. Students explored the intricate planning behind structures like Victoria Square and the new Transport Hub, gaining a newfound appreciation for the foundation work that ensures their stability. A highlight of the day was witnessing the Belfast Weir in action. Watching it *"creep open very slowly"* to protect the city from flooding left the students in awe of the critical yet understated role civil engineers play in safeguarding communities.

The Department of Civil Engineering at QUB showcased its collaborative work with leading companies, introducing students to exciting apprenticeship opportunities and career pathways. The event underscored how civil engineering offers not only intellectual challenges but also the chance to make a tangible difference in the world.

As Andrzej summed up: "The care put into simple, but critical tasks, is admirable."

For anyone considering a future in civil engineering, it's a career that combines problem-solving with the profound satisfaction of building a better world.

THE ST LOUIS CENTENARY BOOK by Derval Fitzsimons

The call came in December 2023 from an old classmate, Margaret Henry. Would I consider helping produce a booklet to mark the school's 100th anniversary? How could I say no to a friend of 50, years. And so a small group of us embarked on a journey that would last almost the entire year.

The book committee, as we became known, consisted of past pupils Margaret Henry, Mary Merron, Dolores O'Loan, Roisin Lynch and myself, former pupil and teacher Mary McCarthy, retired school Secretary Maire McCormack and St Louis Head of RE Shauna Rose Pickering.

We began work just after Christmas trying to piece together a history of the school from its inception in 1924 to the present day.

I have been a journalist most of my life, having started writing for the Ballymena Guardian while I was still at school. However, our task was complicated by the fact that I now live in South West Montana in the heart of the Rockies.

Thank goodness for technology - all our meetings were conducted online and while I interviewed, researched and

wrote the history, the committee members were sifting through and sourcing hundreds of photographs and documents spanning 100 years. Together we were able to uncover previously unpublished material which gives a unique insight into the history of St Louis.

The school that we know today was born when four brave sisters came to Ballymena from Monaghan at the behest of the All Saints Parish Priest Canon Thomas O'Donnell. Together, they created for us a solid foundation in both education and in the Catholic ethos. It took less than 100 years for St Louis to be named the top school in Northern Ireland.

"Our First Century at Kintullagh" was launched at a special event at the school on December 7, 2024. Storm Darragh did its best to thwart us, but despite the awful weather a huge crowd turned out for the launch and to reminisce about their days on the Hill of Kintullagh. A huge thank you to everyone who was there and to all of those who contributed to the book.

It started out life as a booklet but today stands as a tribute to all those parents, pupils, sisters and staff who have made St Louis what it is today.







'OUR FIRST CENTURY AT KINTULLAGH' Centenary Book Launch

The launch of 'Our First Century at Kintullagh' took place in December. We were delighted to be joined by the author of the book, Derval Fitzsimons, as well as contributors and past pupils, Olivia Nash (1953-1960), Kate McCann (1969-1976), Marianne O'Kane (1980-1987) and Seán O'Boyle (1980-1987).

The audience were thoroughly entertained as our contributors reminisced about their schooldays.

Olivia Nash recounted her first day as a boarder at St Louis and the shock that her parents and grandad received when they realised it would just be Olivia and one other girl, Ann McNicholl, boarding in the Convent! Olivia recalled that after the day girls had all gone home – she and Ann would be taken down into the empty school to study.

Kate McCann's memories included hiding in a vaulting horse during PE and then under an oil tank to avoid class, invariably being caught by teachers.

Head Girl, Marianne O'Kane, recalled an infamous incident involving the statue of St Louis in the main foyer as well as the leadership of the women of St Louis. Head Boy in 1987, Seán O'Boyle, spoke movingly about the inspiring teachers at St Louis including Sister Sheila,

Roberta Thompson and Declan Martin and how St Louis remains an exemplar in education.

It was a lovely way in which to bring our Centenary celebrations to a close whilst looking forward to the next 100 years of St Louis in Ballymena.

Having left St Louis in 2005 it was John's first time back on the Hill of Kintullagh. He was delighted to see some of the development that has taken place.

John said, "Coming from an engineering background it is lovely to see how the new Centre of Excellence for Creative and Expressive Arts has been so sensitively integrated with the refurbished Kintullagh House. I've always had an interest in the restoration of old buildings and the work on Kintullagh House has been beautifully done. What a place to have your music lessons!"

John was the first of his family to attend St Louis, followed by brothers, Vincent, Peter and Neil. His sister, Susan, was the last of his siblings to attend and only left in 2023. Having studied Maths, Technology and History at A level John went on to do a Civil Engineering degree at Queen's. However, after two years he decided to leave.

John explained, "I have always been very clear as to what I need to do to get to where I want to be. I thoroughly enjoyed my time at St Louis and have to say that the teachers are really wonderful. Anytime I see them around they always say hello and ask after us all.

When I started university I could see that full time studying wasn't for me, I wanted to work and learn the skills I felt would be most

useful for me in my career. It was the right decision. From working as a senior engineer on the development of The Dub playing fields in Belfast to working for Bradley's in Kilrea things progressed very quickly and it wasn't long until I felt the time was right to strike out on my own.

I formed Shannon Site Solutions in 2013 and we now provide fit out and maintenance services for some of the biggest companies locally including Asda, Co-Op, Home Bargains, KFC, M&S, Howdens and Junction One. We also built Belfast Self-Storage warehouse, which everyone instantly recognises – the large blue and yellow building off Kennedy Way which you see from the MI – it was, and still is, a great advert for us"

When asked if he had any advice for pupils today at St Louis, John recounted a story about winning contracts with some of the multinationals he now works with.

"I am confident on a worksite and have no problem ensuring that everyone is doing what they need to be doing! However put me in front of senior managers from any of our larger clients and I can get somewhat nervous. I recognised that as the company grew this was a problem and so I talked to a business coach about the best way to overcome this. And, while I still don't look forward to it, I knew that for me and the company to succeed I had to. I would encourage pupils that no matter what they end up doing in their careers to always recognise that you can continually be improving. I believe that my resilience and openness to learning was instilled in me at St Louis and for that I am very grateful".
